



## Health & Business Roundtable Indonesia (HBRI)

The Health & Business Roundtable Indonesia (HBRI) was formed in January of 2008 by companies and NGOs to build the relationships, trust, and learning needed for partnerships to improve workplace and community health. They developed guidelines for the process that allows members to freely exchange information on their interests, concerns, activities, challenges, and ideas for addressing health issues and health-related issues including HIV/AIDS, tuberculosis, malaria, maternal and child health, clean water, and sanitation. Members discuss how they can partner effectively with each other and with local governments to ensure sustainable services and programs to improve health. Special attention is given to how partnerships increase the availability of health resources to more women.

As of November 2009, more than 60 organizations have joined HBRI. Members participate in half-day sessions held quarterly that are for members only and off-the-record. Meetings showcase presentations by companies and NGOs on partnerships supporting sustainable health services in the workplace and communities. Presentations are used to prepare case studies on how the partnerships are formed and implemented and their results. Roundtable sessions are complemented by technical workshops on partnership skills. Topics have included how to identify and select partners, partnership communication issues, measuring partnership needs, progress, and results, and sustainability. The group communicates between sessions through a members-only online group. Products and outcomes of HBRI to date include five case studies and one new partnership.

HBRI is an activity of *Company-Community Partnerships for Health in Indonesia (CCPHI)*, a project led by the Public Health Institute (PHI) with The Fund for Peace (FfP) and funded by the Ford Foundation. The project facilitates health-related partnerships among companies, NGOs, and local governments. HBRI is modeled after the Human Rights and Business Roundtable, a 12-year project of FfP.

In May 2009, CCPHI launched the transition to ensure sustainability of HBRI. CCPHI is working with two Indonesian NGOs that will take over responsibility for its activities. Pacivis, an NGO with eight years of facilitation and NGO capacity-building experience, facilitates HBRI sessions and workshops. Jurnal Perempuan (JP), an NGO with 14 years of research and communication experience on gender equality issues including health, translated the first case study into Bahasa Indonesian and will work with CCPHI to disseminate partnership information throughout Indonesia. In addition, members are beginning to provide in-kind and financial support for HBRI activities to contribute to the sustainability of the Roundtable.
