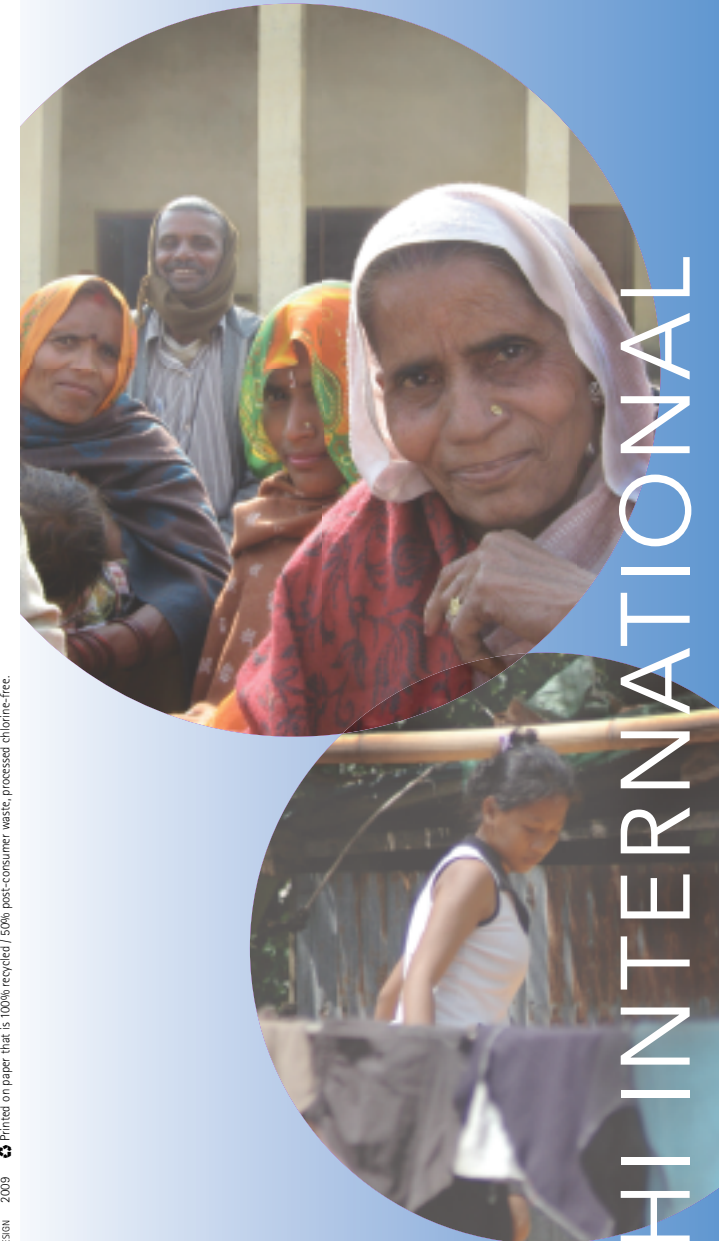

GLOBAL HEALTH FELLOWS PROGRAM

GLOBAL HEALTH FELLOWS PROGRAM (GHFP)

GHFP partners with the US Agency for International Development (USAID) to recruit, hire and support diverse technical experts committed to strengthening the Agency's health leadership and to support effective systems that enable professional development and organizational performance.

PHI is the lead partner in a collaboration that includes:

- Harvard School of Public Health
- Management Systems International
- Tulane University School of Public Health and Tropical Medicine

The major program result areas are:

- Recruitment, placement, support and development of health professionals at all levels. GHFP Fellows and Interns can be found working at USAID overseas Missions, the Global Health Bureau and regional bureaus in Washington, D.C. Opportunities for field experience, mentoring and career development are provided.
- The Diversity Initiative, focusing on creating and providing opportunities for individuals of diverse backgrounds to gain exposure to global health programs and build their skills.
- Organizational development opportunities for USAID and professional development opportunities for fellows, interns and current USAID staff. World-class leaders help USAID maximize results and strengthen its leadership role in global health.

Fellows help to craft policy, implement and manage programs as well as provide technical and managerial expertise. In addition, they benefit from professional development opportunities and mentoring relationships with senior international health faculty from GHFP's university partners.

GHFP Fellows are recruited for specific positions in Washington, D.C., and in developing countries where they work full time for two to four years. Currently, GHFP has approximately 90 fellows working in Washington, D.C., and overseas.

INTERNATIONAL HEALTH PROGRAMS (IHP)

Tuition-Based Workshops

Since 1972, IHP has trained more than 6,300 health care professionals from 121 countries in an array of public health topics. IHPs' technical and leadership courses are offered in English, Arabic and Spanish.

International Family Planning Leadership Program (IFPLP)

IFPLP builds family planning and reproductive health leadership development capacity in institutes of higher education in Ethiopia, India, Nigeria, Pakistan and the Philippines.

Youth Leadership in Sexual and Reproductive Health Program (GOJoven)

GOJoven develops networks of emerging leaders in the Summit Foundation focus countries of Belize, Guatemala, Honduras and Quintana Roo, Mexico, to enable them to improve adolescent sexual and reproductive health.

Adolescent Initiative for Reproductive Health (AIR)

AIR will improve the sexual and reproductive health and rights of adolescents by strengthening individual and institutional leadership capacity in Central America and southern Mexico through advocacy training, grant-making and technical assistance initiatives.

Adolescent Girls Advocacy and Leadership Initiative (AGALI)

AGALI will advance girls' human rights, health and socio-economic well being by supporting advocacy initiatives and strengthening leadership capacity among emerging and established leaders in Africa and Latin America.

Summit Educational Scholarship

Competitively selected Summit Fellow Alumni of GOJoven are given scholarships that will enable them to improve young people's sexual and reproductive health and rights in Central America and Mexico.
